Class News

Reception:

We have had a very busy and exciting first fortnight in Reception. I am pleased at how well everybody is now settling into the school routines and we have enjoyed watching their friendship flourish. It is lovely to see the teamwork and resilience shining through each day. We have started to introduce our 'Helpur Heddiw' and the children have been great at taking on this role, especially in support their friends.

We have been focusing on aspects of our topic 'A Shipwreck in Stormy Seas' to identify the different jobs we could find on a ship; we have also created a soundscape to express the sounds we may hear through the art. We have also begun to use 2D shapes in our explore time to support our learning and have been using them to create a ship and build a castle. Reception have really enjoyed learning the Conkers song for the harvest, could I ask we continue to practise this at home, we have started to add actions to our song, maybe you could ask your child to show you these? Thank you for your support.

Year One:

This fortnight in Year 1 the children have been learning all about 2D shapes. We had a lot of fun using these to recreate the animals from The Enormous Crocodile for Roald Dahl day, as well as enjoying a visit from Danny the champion of the world himself! Children are also enjoying reading The Magic Finger at the end of each day. In PE we have been learning some new hockey skills, and children have been dribbling and passing to each other this week. I have been very impressed with how safe they have all been when using the equipment. The children are settling in well to their new routines and learning environment, and have been treating each other with kindness and respect when contributing to class discussions. Keep it up, Year 1!

Year Two:

We have had a very busy first fortnight in Year Two. We have been settling in and getting used to new routines and expectations. It's been lovely to see the children working together during explore time and rebuilding their friendships. In our numeracy lessons we have been revising place value and number bonds as well as adding single digits to 7, 8 & 9. We have also been subtracting numbers and learning how addition and subtraction are related. We have been writing questions and answers in Welsh, asking somebody their name and the school they go to. In Humanities we've learnt about the different jobs and roles aboard a ship and appraised a painting. In P.E, the pupils are using actions and sequences to create a pirate dance and learning to dribble and pass a ball with a hockey stick. Our kerbcraft lessons are building road safety awareness and helping to keep our pupils alert to dangers.

Year Three:

We've had a very busy couple of weeks, but all the children are settling in brilliantly to year 3. In Maths we have been consolidating our understanding of place value, comparing numbers using mathematical symbols. We have started to explore different strategies for adding larger numbers — this was tricky to start, but we persevered! We have been learning about the life of Queen Elizabeth II and all the amazing things she did, and started to think about all the things that might change now that we have a new King. The children have all written messages of support to the Royal Family — I am so impressed with how thoughtful, respectful and compassionate they have been. The children enjoyed our first visit to Forest School this week, exploring and collaborating to create some impressive royal themed art from natural materials. As part of our Topic work we have looked in depth at the painting A Shipwreck in Stormy Seas and compared it to a number of different seascapes, and we are now looking forward to creating our own.







Year Four:

We have had a busy two weeks settling into a new term. In Numeracy we have been looking at place value and comparing numbers using greater than/less than symbols. In Literacy we are studying the book-Flotsam. This is a picture book that has encouraged skills of inference and deduction, together with beautiful illustrations to portray the story. This week we have been learning how to use speech marks correctly using the story of Flotsam. Each child has written a message of condolence to the Queen which will be displayed in a book shared by all the children in the school. The artistic creation- A Shipwreck in Stormy Seas by Claude-Joseph Vernet, has created lots of discussion as to what we can actually see and what we would like to find out. The children are now in the process of creating mood boards and comparing other seascapes. Forest School will take place every Wednesday and the children are very excited about this already! Hopefully the weather will be kind for at least the next few weeks! Your child now has a set day which they will read, so please ensure they have their diaries and books with them on this day.

Year Five:

Another busy two weeks in Year 5, with all the children settling into school life brilliantly. I was very impressed and proud of how the class have responded to the pass of Queen Elizabeth II. After reading through the poem written by the poet laureate for the Queen, they had the opportunity to write their own acrostic poems where they all showed sensitivity and maturity, remembering the life of our monarch. In literacy we have continued to explore the characters of The Tempest, imagining we are Ferdinand and how we would feel arriving on the Island with No Name. We have used a diary entry to share these thoughts and feelings successfully.

This week we have begun to look at the artist Claude-Joseph Vernet in more detail and have begun to research the type of artist he was and look at the other paintings he created, comparing them with 'A shipwreck on Stormy Seas'. We have also worked closely with Year 6 completing Outdoor Maths activities problem solving how to find out the height of a tree without climbing it!

We have also had the opportunity this week to work collaboratively with Year 6 to complete our Pupil Voice, thinking of different ideas for what we would like to learn for this term's topic and then adding the details to the correct AOLE to help with planning.

Year Six:

Two weeks seems to have sped by since our last newsletter and what a busy two weeks they have been. I was incredibly proud of all of our year 6 children who have written about Queen Elizabeth II which such sensitivity, respect and thoughtfulness. They wrote acrostic poems after studying the double acrostic poem written by the Poet Laureate and the emotion they showed was simply wonderful - bendigedig year 6. We have continued our study of The Tempest in literacy, writing diary entries from the perspective of Ferdinand after finding himself abandoned on the island. The children took great care in trying to use their inference skills to determine what Ferdinand was feeling and helped peer assess each others work to improve it. Our humanities work has led us into exploring the life of Claude Joseph Vernet including his early life, his influences and his style as a neo-classicist. It was up to the children then to decide how to present their work which ranged from adobe spark to google slides. We have enjoyed working alongside year 5 to gather pupil voice about the new topic and have begun to work on our fitness with circuit training and swimming. We have continued our work on place value and moved into addition. We also used our reasoning skills, problem solving and trial and error to determine how we could measure the height of trees and solve the problem "The tallest trees have the largest leaves – prove it!". Get them to demonstrate the method to you and have a go at home! Keep up the good work year 6!
