

Positive Relationships

This term we have been reviewing our Behaviour and Relationships Policy whilst engaging with pupils, staff and external partners.. The updated policy can be found on the school website in the Policy Section. The key area updated in the policy is the clarity of procedure followed when negative behaviours are displayed. In discussion with staff and pupil ambassadors a series of sanctions were agreed along with the introduction of a 'Think' sheet. This is where an individual completes the form alongside an adult to record what happened, how others felt and what they would do next time if in a similar situation. Alongside this we have also enabled; further training for staff in L2 Apprenticeship to engage in positive play, utilised of clubiau Cymru resources and training to promote positive play, engaged with MonLife to deliver sessions to both staff and pupils ensuring full utilisation of the Playmaker Sports Leaders Training. Our INSET Day confirmed for Friday 24th November is with Commando Joes- sessions that promote skills in team work, cooperation, communication. We are in the process of purchasing additional equipment so that 'zones' of play can be established. Collaboration with the Health & Well Being Committee to hear how they perceive playtimes could be improved. We have restructured lunchtimes to reduce the length of time groups of learners are outside, by having lunch in the middle of the break rather than eating and then having a long period of time 'playing'. Since September I have been meeting my grandson from school on a Wednesday and more often than not, we have stayed in the yard for him to play with his friends.

I want you to know how impressed I am with this facility and with the way that the children play together. When I was a child it was quite common for children to play outdoors without adult supervision and although I appreciate that children today have far more advantages than we did back in the 1950s, we had far more freedom for imaginative play and unstructured sport. Last week it was enjoyable to watch children play together; girls and boys of different ages. There was no adult interference that I was aware of, the children just got on so well together. Even my 3 year old granddaughter joined in running up and down the yard and at another time in and out of the trees. I don't want to labour the point by mentioning every piece of equipment, the open spaces and hideouts, but I do want to let you know that I think that this facility is of immense importance and that the children are very lucky to be able to play informally. Congratulations for implementing this play period. Long may it continue.

Dosbarth 2

Year twos have been learning about symmetrical and asymmetrical shapes in numeracy. They revisited this at Forest School where they worked with year threes to create symmetrical art using natural objects. I was very impressed with their focus and team work as trying to make these pieces of work was a challenge. In literacy, the pupils listened to the book 'Giraffe is left out' which is a message about how we should behave and is an anti-bullying story. They then planned and created an anti-bullying poster with some excellent pieces of advice. We have started to learn about family members in Welsh and how we ask if someone has a brother or a sister. Pupils are improving with their use of this sentence pattern: i'Oes brawd/chwaer da ti?' (Do you have a brother/sister) and answering it with 'Oes. Mae brawd/chwaer da fi.' (Yes I have a brother/sister) or 'Nag oes. Does dim brawd/ chwaer da fi.' (I don't have a brother/ sister.) We celebrated Children in Need Day with a special daily mile and by learning to draw Pudsey. There are some great artists in Year Two!



Dosbarth 3

We started the fortnight by taking part in an anti-bullying week live lesson, after which we thought about how we could celebrate differences, accept other people, and make a noise about bullying. We continued this in our Literacy lessons, where we looked at how the BFG was bullied by the other giants, and discussed the difference between physical and verbal bullying. We then worked in groups to role-play how we could act in different scenarios. At the end of the week we had a lovely day in our pyjamas celebrating Children in Need. The children worked through a carousel of activities including writing about inspirational adults in our lives, creating a Children in Need themed acrostic poem, and learning how to draw Pudsey. We also completed our run Pudsey, with an amazing 97 laps completed between us – fantastic effort everybody! This week we recognised World Children's Day. We thought about the rights of the child, working in groups to discuss a selection of the 42 articles and diamond rank them in order of which we thought we were most important. We also created some amazing blue-themed art, colour mixing to make our own unique colours, and thinking carefully about shade and tone in our masterpiece.

We have continued our work on multiplication and division in Maths, using resources to physically group and share objects before moving on to writing sums accurately. Our Samba drumming is coming along well, with us all playing different rhythm patterns confidently as part of a group, and we have enjoyed exploring how to make different characters move at the same time on Scratch.

A busy and productive few weeks in Year 4 we really enjoyed celebrating Children in Need Day last Fridaywhere we had a rather cosy day in our pyjamas and dressing gowns! This Monday saw us dress up again, this time in 'Blue' to mark World Children's Day. Thank you all for your support with these days. In Literacy last week we were discussing why the boy from Stone Age Boy decided to become an archaeologist. Who inspired him? What were his dreams for the future? We then moved on to our dreams and aspirations for the future. Which people do we aspire to and why? What have they achieved in their life? Do you have a family member that inspires you to do something? Swimming lessons commenced last week which was all very exciting. At Forest School the children made a range of analogue and digital clocks using natural materials. They never cease to amaze us with their creativity and imagination. We regularly check in with "pupil voice" and in discussion about our topic, the children would like to cook some of the things stone age people would have eaten. We may have to substitute some of the foods as I did find it a challenge trying to catch a woolly mammoth! In Numeracy, we have worked hard with analogue and digital time and can see the progress the children have made- it hasn't been easy! In Welsh, we have been working hard to read a Welsh text called Yn y goedwig, yn y nos. (In the forest in the night) There is a copy of the text in our Year 4 drive. The children have been practising their reading skills and pronunciation as well as being able to ask and answer questions about it- da iawn! As always, spellings and some suggestions for home learning are in our Google Classroom every week. Thank you for your support.



Dosbarth 5 So the weather is on the change, and we can finally enjoy a crisp, cold autumn before we embrace winter. Dosbarth 5 have been very engaged, hardworking and a delight to teach. Last week we created a shared narrative poem in Literacy for remembrance, we upleveled vocabulary, stuck to the success criteria and included poetic devices. We also impressed everyone with our drawings of poppies in our artwork. In maths we continued with division and multiplication looking at multiples, factors and prime numbers, this week we have been focusing on square and cubed numbers as well as multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000. We enjoyed creating artwork in forest school using natural resources to show our knowledge of pop art artist Andy Warhol. In PE we enjoyed our session with County in the Community and our first netball session where we learnt how to pass the ball 3 ways, shoulder pass, chest pass and bounce pass. We enjoyed mini matches and worked so well together as a team. In Welsh we are learning about hobbies and sharing our likes and dislikes using the phrases "Dw i'n mwynhau / dwlu ar / casáu" (I enjoy/ love/ hate) and will continue to practice this, this week. We began our creating media unit in ICT which the children are excited about. We finished the week celebrating Children in Need with a pyjama party (I could definitely get used to this soooo cosy), the daily mile lap count and of course the famous school disco – diolch to the PTFA for a great evening! In literacy this week we have continued to share Floella Benjamins journey and new experiences as she arrives safely in London, but it isn't quite what she expected... we will be learning how to write a piece of persuasive text by creating an anti-racist manifesto outlining the ways in which we as a class, school and wider community will promote and adopt behaviours to ensure an anti-racist society. In Italian we have been rehearsing greetings. Buongiorno – Good morning, Come stai? - How are you? Bene, grazie - Fine, thanks. Dosbarth 6 With Christmas drawing ever closer, Dosbarth 6 continue to be super busy in their learning. Our literacy has seen us focus on letter writing, drawing on the motivations of characters and using colloquialisms to centre their writing in a specific time and place. Dosbarth 6 have a newfound love of fractions through simplifying them, adding and subtracting them and converting them from improper fractions to mixed numbers and vice versa. They also spent time in their numeracy lessons studying the census data for Trellech from 1841 and 2021, identifying trends and patterns of ages and gender and graphing the results. It was fascinating to listen to their ideas as to why these changes may have taken place. Expressive arts saw the culmination of all their hard work on sculptures as they made Giacometti inspired wire sculptures. The results were incredible, showing such a range of emotions and movement. To help us delve deeper into our topic of "Who do you think you are?", Katie Churchill came to share with us some of the artefacts she has unearthed in Trellech during her archaeological dig. This gave our topic such a wonderful grounding, with the pupils being able to handle artefacts from the very place they currently live, only hundreds of years old. The class ran a total of 37 miles in their daily mile time, lots choosing to continue through the start of their lunch break, designed and pitched new Pudsey merchandise and reflected on children's rights whilst completing their blue themed art.
